We have outreach programs such as UTEC that come in and help the inmates, get them back on track, give them the possibility of a job when they get out. I think we need to focus more on that.	I do think that we do have issues with youth violence within the city. What we do at the House of Correction is we put them into programs and we make it so that we teach them. Education is at the forefront of letting, not only the youth, but the people that are incarcerated know what it is that is going on, and what it is they need to change in their behavior. I do think we should supply that but I also feel that we need to focus on identifying the people that may be getting themselves into this predicament and educating them on maybe not becoming parents so young. 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Robert Gignac	In Lowell we have great resources, and great partnerships. I think something we need to do a better job at, is just letting know that there are resources here, that there are people to talk to, and that you're not in this alone.	The City Council has done a great job over the past few years in increasing summer jobs for our city youth and keeping them busy. But also increasing efforts to apply for grants to provide additional summer jobs. I know the city often goes for the SSVI grant which partners with UTEC, the Shannon Grant which battles gangs in the city, as well as Youth Works which provides opportunities.	We're presently looking for opportunities to open an early childhood center to serve the entire city and that does cost quite a bit of money. So serving on the City Council, I would be an advocate to do just that and ensure that we have as many opportunities as possible to serve our young people.	Lowell has a great resource with the Career Center of Lowell and the Greater Lowell Workforce Development Board and partnering with them to provide part-time jobs for young people in social enterprises such as UTEC would give those social enterprises some relief in paying those wages and making sure that those young people have the proper training and are workforce ready. We met with gang leaders and we offered them a way out. That's what we had to do, we offered them services and support and we took a lot of people off the street and got them out of gangs. But we learned from that how to work with each other and that's when community policing really stepped up.	When you talk about early childhood education and pre-school education, it's really important and it's all about the money. We have to find the funds to support early childhood education.	I think UTEC and the city have to work even closer together and find out from UTEC what kinds of internships UTEC's youth would like to see.
